

That she has been well acquainted with Patrick Wrin and with his family including the deceased soldier George Wrin for the last 30 years. That she was a near neighbor of said family during all of the year 1865 and continually thereafter until the death of said soldier and since. That she well and even intimately acquainted with the circumstances and doings of said family during all of said time. That during and prior to 1865 Patrick Wrin the claimant was sick and entirely dependent on his son George Wrin.
