

## REPORT OF THE CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE ON SEWING MACHINES.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 27.

To the Executive Committee, Northwestern Sanitary Fair:

The undersigned, Chairman of the Committee on Sewing Machines, begs leave to report the following donations and offers from the several parties named:

Willcox & Gibbs, New York, with their agents here, L. Cornell & Co., 133 Lake street, Chicago, donate three first-class sewing-machines, the cash value of which is \$255, and a further donation of one-quarter of the price of all the committee may call for during the Fair.

The Florence Manufacturing Company, of Florence, Mass., through their agent, William H. Sharp & Co., 100 Washington street, donate three first-class sewing machines—cash value \$300.

Wheeler & Wilson, Manufacturing Company, through their agent, Geo. R. Chittenden, 106 Lake street, donate two first class sewing machines—cash value \$237—and a further offer of one-fourth the price of all other machines called for by the committee during the Fair.
