NEW ENGLAND FARM HOUSE.

The Ladies connected with this Department of the Fair have adopted the following new regulations for admission to their entertainments: Doors will be open for admission to BREAKFAST from 8 to 9, to DINNER from 12 to 2, to SUPPER from 5½ to 7. At each of these, nothing but meal tickets will admit any one. Doors will be open, besides the above, for visitors from 10 to 12 A. M., 3 to 5, and 7 to 10 P. M., and all persons holding season tickets issued by the Executive Committee of the Fair will be admitted without extra charge, others only upon special admission tickets, costing 25 cents each. There will be no variation from the above, except at some special evening entertainment, occasionally during the Fair, when special admission tickets are required, at an extra charge, of which previous notice will be given. The price of meal tickets will be 50 cents for either breakfast or supper, and 75 cents for dinner. Ice Cream and Strawberries will be furnished at Dinner and Supper and at the evening entertainments, but always at an extra charge of twenty (20) cents for either dish.
