ART SKETCHES—No. 4.

We have been admonished that we lingered too long in our descriptions of the paintings, given in our former numbers, for though their merits deserved such protracted notice, there could be no room at the slow pace at which we were proceeding, for the numerous other works deserving mention. Henceforth brevity must characterize our descriptions.

103. Lake George, by Hubbard, a picture in spirit and handling eminently Preraffaelite, to those who have not examined such pictures, and there are many persons, tolerably educated who have no conception of them, it is well worth study as an example.

105. A Mountain Torrent, by Hart, painted with an unusual amount of feeling, strongly addressing itself to the poetic favor common to all men of cultivated imagination.

26. Walnut Gatherers, by Von Seben. This excites some attention on account of the singularity of the subject, and the method of treatment the artist has seen fit to use in regard to it. While in the throng in the gallery, we frequently hear the objection that the action represented is a beginning to do, which has ceased, and that the figures appear to be transfixed in the midst of exciting occupations. We hardly think the criticism just.

97. Hart's Harvest Field in New England. This is a beautiful picture. Natural in its story, recalling to ones mind a thousand very similar scenes, with their ordinary, yet to us out in the west, poetic accessions. The stone walls, distant farm houses, the waving grain already ripe for harvest, the jutting rock, the wild briar rose, the little hills which bound the arable land, are poetically rendered, while the sky is very fine, in this respect comparing favorably with some of the more pretentious pictures in the collection, where the artists have substituted for atmosphere a dirty haze.

266. Selecting the Bridal Dress, by Carolus. A singular and meritorious work, representing the stately manners of the middle of the last century. The subject which gives the name to the picture is but an incident of the old school politeness, expressed in the grouping of the figures, the costumes, the texture of broadcloth, silk, satin, carpet, damask and furniture, which are almost perfection.

141. Souvenir of the Alps, by Paul Weber. This is a fine picture, moderate in tone, size, and pretensions, compared with Bierstadts Rocky Mountains, yet the effect is truer to nature than in its more ambitious rival — of the glacier on the remote hill tops, with the shining sun disclosing the minute depressions while it lights up the everlasting snow, reminding us of fretted, glistening silver ware, an effect often noticed yet rarely pictured, while the mountain bird sweeping along the valley in its solitary course, adds wildness and desolation to the scene.

185. A picture of wild scenery of a different character from the last, is the Stampede of Buffaloes, by Hays. The dreary American desert over which these animals roam; the Platt River with its swift running current, in which as in the fabled Sambattayon the sand can almost be seen moving towards the sea, the sand bars so easily formed to be as easily washed away, the bluffs which part the valley from the table land, the atmosphere with its susceptibility to mirage, the general asidity of the scene, and the light indicating the clear but tiresome day; show, in this hitherto untouched subject, the artist's feeling. The buffaloes in the foreground are spirited and natural, and the lengthing herd, winding its way into the remote wilderness, exceedingly suggestive.

108. Deer attacked by Wolves, by Somner. A subject, to be properly handled, requiring the highest degree of art. Here the animal life is spirited, intense, and natural, the coloring as well as the drawing, fine; the foreshortening of the wolf, in the left-hand corner of the picture, remarkably well done; the real lover of art must be pleased with the vigor and force though we confess it is displayed on a subject distasteful to some persons of refinement.

Named in the catalogue as a Landscape, by George Inness, is a picture which surrounded as it is by more obtrusive works, does not receive the attention it merits; the murkiness of the sky seems its only defect.

10. The Wreck, by the same artist, receives a considerable notice, the vividness and reality of the representation commends it to the judgment of learned and unlearned, in matters of art.

295. In striking contrast to the most of the pictures we have examined, is Morning in Norwalk Island, by G. L. Brown. The clearness of the sky into which we look, and do not find our vision bounded; the land, the pellucid clearness of the water, and the solid primitive rocks in the foreground, all in transparent harmony, render this painting one of the most attractive of the collection.
