This occurred just before the President left for Richmond, and though burdened with the grave cares of the nation, he could yet remember the incident, and his autograph letter herewith is the fulfillment. "Fondly do we hope—fervently do we pray—that this mighty scourge of war may speedily pass away. yet, if God will's that it continue until all the wealth piled by the bondman's two hundred and fifty years of unrequited toil shall be sunk, and every drop of blood drawn with the lash shall be paid by another drawn with the sword, as was said three thousand years ago, so still it must be said: 'The judgements of the Lord are true, and righteous a. together.'"
