The paper will be called The Voice of the Fair, and will be the organ of the Northwestern Sanitary Fair, giving the programme thereof, lists of donations, reports and descriptions of the Fair, etc., together with original and selected literary articles of a general character. The committee have, by urgent invitation, secured the services of Andrew Shuman, of the Evening Journal, as editor of the paper. He will be assisted by members of the committee and by competent reporters; and original contributions are already promised for its columns by eminent writers East and West, including our leading Generals and statesmen. Daily reports will be published of the donations, sales and incidents of the Fair, in a gossipy chit-chat. It will be printed on the best quality of book paper, on new type, and will be, in every respect, a first-class publication, both as to its contents and appearance. It will be of good size, and convenient for circulation. It is anticipated that during the Fair the committee will find it necessary to enlarge the paper to the size of the New York ladies. The committee hope and believe that it will be a spirited and interesting paper, gladly welcomed and freely purchased by the patrons of the Fair, and distributed by them to their friends and correspondents in other parts of the country. The subscription price will be \$1.50 during its publication, embracing about twenty numbers. The trade supplied for \$7 per hundred copies; single copies 10 cents each.
