Biographical Note:

Robert Stewart was born in 1837, younger brother of Agnes Stewart Carlisle. Family, John Stewart, brother, Trained with the !st at Camp Harvey, Kenosha, Wisconsin and Camp Benton(Benton Barracks) St. Louis, Missouri. Deployed with the unit to southern Missouri and northern Arkansas. Died at the Post Hospital at Jefferson Barracks in St. Louis on November 13th, 1862 from dysentery. Buried at Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery, St. Louis, Missouri. Plot location Section 11, Site 8475.
