Brief History of Co. C, 4th Indiana Cavalry

August, 1862 – Left Warsaw, Indiana for Camp Allen in Fort Wayne where they remained for about a week. The company was organized and the following officers were elected:

- Jos. P. Leslie Capt.
- Jos Leamon 1st Lieut.
- Andrew P. Gallagher 2nd Lieut.
- · S. G. Robbins Brev. 2nd Lieut.

August 12, 1862 - (Approx.) Left for Indianapolis. Went into camp with the regiment which was then organizing.

August 17, 1862 – Mustered into United States service known as Co. C. 77th Regiment or 4th Indiana Cavalry. Received uniforms and side arms.

September 6, 1862 – Co. was ordered to Cincinnati. Arrived there the same night; received horses and went into camp.

September 7, 1862 – Received saddles, bridles and other camp equipage. Remained there until Sept. 18. Crossed Ohio River on several night scouting trips.

Reported to Brig. Gen. Q. A. who was commanding the advance forces in Kentucky. Went on many two or three day scouting trips. Most scouting done at night. Changed cmap from time to time. Arrived at Lexington, KY, where co. remained for a few days.

October 31, 1862 – Ordered to report to Brig. Gen. A. J. Smith for escort duty. On same day, marched with him to Nicholasville, KY. Remained a few days and then marched to Louisville, KY.

November 25, 1862 – Embarked on steamer Florence and started down Ohio River.

November 29, 1862 – Arrived at Cairo, IL. Disembarked from the Florence and boarded the *Maria Denning* on the Mississippi River.

December 1, 1862 - Started down the Mississippi River.

December 4, 1862 - Arrived at Memphis, TN. Went into camp and remained until Dec. 21.

December 21, 1862 - Embarked on the steamer Ohio Belle and started down river.

December 24, 1862 – Arrived at Millikin's Bend on Dec. 24, remained there until Dec. 27, went withGen. Sherman up the Yazoo River where he made his first attack onVicksburg, Miss. Then returned to Mississippi River and went with Gen. John McClernand up the Arkansas River.

Auust 30, 1864 – Arrived at Cartersville, GA. Did picket duty on Pumpkin Vine Creek to Alatoona until middle of October and then mrched to Calhoun, GA. Remained about three weeks and then turned horses over to Gen. Kilpatrick and returned to Louisville, KY, after other horses.

December 4, 1864 – Left Louisville on the march to Nashville, and arrived at Bowling Green, KY on Dec. 12.

Pursued a rebel brigade, under Gen. Lyon. Crossed the Cumberland River at Hopkinsville, KY. Followed them as far as Elizabethtown and on Dec. 25 started for Nashville.

December 29, 1864 – Arrived at Bowling Green, remained there until Jan. 2, 1865, then started for Nashville.

January 6, 1865 – Arrived at Nashville, remained until Jan. 9th, then left for Waterloo, AL, and went into winter quarters.

March 10, 1865 – Crossed the Tennessee River and went to camp at Chickasaw, AL, to make preparations for the campaign.

March 21, 1865 – Started on the Wilson Raid. Rebel force under Gen. Cobb was told to surrender or fight. He surrendered and a few days later his men were paroled and sent home. The comany ate their rations and used clothing and other supplies left by Cobb.

Within a few days word came that Gen. Lee had surrendered to Gen. Grant.

May 10, 1865 (approx.) Our forces captured Jeff Davis while he was playing hide and seek thru the Carolinas and Georgia.

May 24, 1865 – Left for Atlanta, arriving on the 28th of May, after a hot and dusty march. No rations available. Started for Chattanooga, TN, arriving on June 2. Worn out due to scarcity of rations. Horses were very much reduced and worn out also.

Remained at Chattanooga until June 7th. Drew rations for men and forage for horses. Left for Nashville,; after a slow and tedious march, arrived on June 15. Crossed the Cumberland River and went into camp at Edgefield, TN, where horses and equip. were turned over and were mustered out of service on June 29.

July 7, 1865 – Were paid in full.

History was taken from newspaper article after 4th Indiana Cavalry had its first reunion shortly after end of Civil War.

Period of Jan. 1863 thru Aug. 1864 was missing from above article which was pieced together from old newspaper.

On the list of enlisted men it was notd where each died & when if killed in battle. Men were killed at the following locations: Louisville, Millikens Bend, LA (many); Vicksburg; St. Louis; Nashville; Memphis; mound City, IL; Lexington, KY; New Iberia, LA.

History of 4th Indiana Cavalry

Organized in Indianapolis 8/22/62 with Isaac P. Gray as Col. After organization, the affairs in Kentucky were threatened. The regiment was divided into 4 companies undr Major John A. Platter being ordered to Henderson, KY, and the remainder to Louisville and then to the interior of the state.

The battalion commanded by Maj. Platter engaged the enemy at Madisonville on Aug. 28th, just 4 days after being mustered in, losing a number of either killed or wounded. In the spring of 1863 the regiment was again all together with the exception of Co. C which was detailed for escort duty at the headquarters of Gen. A. J. Smith where it remained.

During the invasin of Kentucky by Gen. Bragg, the 4th Cavalry did excellent service scouting the enemy and frequently engaging him. In Dec., engaged in the ursuit of Gen. Morgan and was in the battle fought with Morgan's troops near Munfordsville in which the rebels were badly whipped. Moving into Tenn. in Jan. 1863, the regiment reached Murfreesboro in Feb. where they remained for some months.

When Gen. Rosecrans moved forward on his campaign against Tullahoma & Chattanooga, the 4th Cav. led the advance and in the bloody Battle of Chickamauga, it took a prominent part after which it moved to East Tenn. where it remained until the spring of 1864.

On the 27th of January, 1864, the 4th Cavalry was engaged in a severe fight with the enemy at Fair Garden in which a battalion of four companies undr the command of Lt. Col. Leslie, made a saber charge on a rebel battery capturing it and more prisoners than were engaged in the charge. Lt. Col. Leslie was killed by a rebel bullet through his breast while gallantly leading and encouraging

his men. During the campaign against Atlanta, the 4th Cavalry operated on the flanks of gen. Sherman's army and took part in the McCook Raid and was engaged in several battles after the fall of Atlanta. The regiment returned to Tenn. where it was assigned to Gen. Wilson's Cavalry Division and in the spring of 1865 accompanied it on a raid in Alabama during which it was engaged with the enemy at Plantersville and Selma.

The was having been ended, the regiment made its way north to Edgefield, Tenn. where it ws mustered out of the service on the 29th of June 1865 and the officers and men returned to their homes without going to the state capitol in a body.

Co. C as before mentioned, was detailed for escort duty at the Headquarters of Gen. A. J. Smith and remained with him until late in 1864 when it joined the regiment. During its service with Gen. Smith the company was present in all the operations against Vicksburg and accompanied the ill-fated Red River Expedition.


